Dear Resident,

I'm delighted to introduce the latest edition of Hounslow Matters magazine.

There has been significant local and national change since our last issue, and this one deals with changes that matter to you most.

Our Residents Survey, carried out for us by an accredited, independent agency, gives us a new understanding of your priorities, so we're bringing news and information in the areas we know matter most to you – 'making more affordable homes available', 'education, activities and support for young people', and 'community safety'.

We include information on our climate change and Net Zero work where three quarters of you are interested in, and support, our policies and approaches.

A very high number of residents are satisfied with Hounslow as a place to live, and 88% agree their local area is somewhere people from different backgrounds get on well. But even in our low-crime borough, community safety is a major priority for you, which is why our new community safety approach - with a full complement of staff increased by investment - was introduced earlier this year.

Delivering what people need locally is essential to how we work. Access to services and information is addressed in this issue, with an update on work we're doing to ensure online services are as good as anybody's with excellent experience for all, whether online, on the phone or in-person at our Community Hubs in council buildings and based on local needs

so they offer tailored services and activities which will grow over time.

Our resident survey tells us the future of our young people is a huge priority. So we can all be very proud of their GCSE achievements this year. They performed well above the national and London averages in both Maths (with 63% at grade 5 or above) and English (where Hounslow students performed exceptionally well with 69.9% at grade 5 or above.) We are incredibly proud of all our students, schools and staff.

Availability of affordable homes is another significant priority for residents, and there is positive progress there too, through completion of Tintern, Sonnet, and Hamlet houses in Brentford. Lives are transformed through much-needed, high-quality, sustainable homes which foster inclusive and diverse communities, and this energy-efficient development reflects Hounslow's pledge to provide environmentally efficient housing.

We have much to be proud of in community safety, housing, our young people and much else, but we are not complacent. So, we've written to the new Government to make clear our One Hounslow stands ready to work with them, share our successes and take chances that enable positive change for our local communities. We will keep working to meet residents' priorities, with the new Government and in the service of growth and national renewal.

Making the borough proud -CONGRATULATIONS!


Students and schools from across Hounslow delivered impressive academic results, not only outperforming national and London averages on GCSE results in Maths and English, but also achieving an overall pass rate of 97.3% in A Levels and 98.9% in BTEC qualifications.

A staggering 77.8% of students achieved a grade 4 or above in GCSE Maths, well above the national average of 71.2% and the London average of 76.9%, with 63% securing the more challenging grade 5 or above. This exceeds the national average of 53.3% and the London average of 61%.



Students performed exceptionally well in GCSE English with 82.6% achieving a grade 4 or above and 69.9% achieving a grade 5 or above. These surpassed the national and London averages of 71.2% and 77% respectively at grade 4 or above and 55.4% and 63% at grade 5 or above.

In addition, 44 students passed the new advanced technical qualifications, T Levels. Fourteen Learn Hounslow adult students attempted GCSE Maths exams and achieved a pass grade.



Cabinet Member for Education, Children, Skills and Employment, said: "I

am immensely proud of our students for their achievements. I'd like to thank Headteachers and teachers for working tirelessly to ensure that young



people, including those with special educational needs, are well-equipped with the skills and knowledge they need for a brighter future."

Co-Headteachers of Isleworth and Syon School, Simon Fisher and Jo Higginbottom commented: "These results showcase the benefits of buying into our school culture, as these Isleworthians have brought our 'learners as leaders' philosophy to life by being hands-on in their commitment to their own learning. Although they have faced

unprecedented national and - at times personal challenges, they have always been supported expertly by our outstanding school staff and parents/carers at home."

Mr Luke Homer, School Principal of Rivers Academy West London, said: "We are incredibly proud of all our students and all that they have achieved at school. We would like to take this opportunity to celebrate the resilience, sense of purpose and engagement students have shown as individuals and as a team during their time with us."

ACCESSING OPPORTUNITIES



Work Hounslow, the Council's Skills and Employment team, is offering tailored, one-to-one careers and employment support for women, ethnic minorities and older people in the borough who are currently out of work. These groups have been identified by the Council's Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Strategy as needing additional support to access services and opportunities.

Funded by the UK Government through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, the programme will run over a six-month period. During this time, residents will have the opportunity to meet employment advisors every two weeks, explore career goals, create personalised career plans including improving CVs, whilst preparing for job applications and interviews.

Employment advisors can work with residents to develop career pathways that meet their own personal needs, such as childcare. Work Hounslow also work closely with employers to ensure that employees can enjoy a healthy, balanced works life and are paid (at least) the London Living Wage.



Across Hounslow, before and after school childcare places increased by 497 in September 2024, with 335 increased hours of operation to meet the Department of Education's definition of wraparound childcare. More places are also expected to become available from January 2025.

This includes guidance on how a parent could use their right to request childcare if the local offer does not meet their needs, and information on the ability to use Tax-Free Childcare and Universal Credit Childcare to pay for wraparound if eligible.

NEWS ROUND-UP

Hounslow LEADs the reay

To ensure all children and young people in the borough have access to high-quality education, the Council has launched an exciting new tuition service.

Called LEAD (Learn, Enrich and Develop), the service will provide pupils with high quality short-term tutoring to support their continued attendance and participation in education, where it is agreed attending a school or provision may not be suitable at that time. In most cases, access will be through their existing school, via the EHC team or other suitable education support services.



The service will be rolled out in stages with the needs of students who are educated other than at school prioritised. Children within the Council's responsibility will follow before a wider model of supporting schools is adopted.

Cllr Samia Chaudhary, Cabinet Member for Education, Children, Skills, and Employment said: "I'm excited about this programme. It's an innovative partnership between the local authority and education providers that looks to ensure our young people receive an education that broadens minds and bolsters career prospects."



SOCIAL WORKERS SCORE HAT-TRICK OF NOMINEES

Three social workers from Hounslow Council have been nominated in separate categories for this year's Social Worker of the Year Awards, which are due to be held in November.

Jonas Kurkalang has been nominated for Children's Social Worker of the Year; Andy O'Sullivan is vying for Team Leader of the Year, Children's Services, and Aaron Evans is up for Newly Qualified Adult Social Worker of the Year. All three were nominated by colleagues and chosen by panels of independent judges including previous award winners, social workers, industry leaders and people with lived experience of social work.

The Social Worker of the Year Awards is the only major national awards event for social work in England, attracting hundreds of entries every year.



Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council commented: "It's testament to our team of social workers that they have

achieved multiple nominations at the most prestigious event in the sector. All three have shown the range of qualities necessary to shine in these important roles, including compassion, dedication, and expertise in their respective practises. On behalf the Council, let's wish them the best of luck!"

Regular SEND Surgeries are now known as the SEND Local Offer Live.

With a new name, the idea behind them remains simple, they enable parents, carers or young people to put forward any questions, queries, and comments they may have - either

about their own situation or SEND in general.

RESIDENTS' FEEDBACK NEEDED ON PROPOSED COUNCIL TAX SUPPORT SCHEME CHANGES

Hounslow Council is proposing changes in how it supports residents with their Council Tax payments from April 2025. Proposals include more targeted funding to families and carers.

The Council is calling on residents especially those who get Council Tax Support - to feed back on proposals to change its 'Council Tax Support Scheme', which helps residents on low-income or benefits pay their Council Tax.

The proposals mean some residents could receive more help with their Council Tax bill, while some will receive

less. Changes will help the Council to address a £30 million funding shortfall and protect vital services.

Cllr Shantanu Rajawat, Leader of Hounslow Council, said: "I encourage any resident affected – especially those getting this support now - to give their views on our proposals.

"We know many still grapple with the cost-of-living crisis and our proposals include a dedicated Hardship Fund for any resident who may struggle with a potential increase in payments."

Supporting exceptional educational needs



Residents can use an online calculator to work out how much more or less they would potentially pay, and can take part in the consultation online. Drop-in sessions for residents to discuss proposed changes are listed online.

All mainstream schools in Hounslow are now members of the Mainstream Inclusion Partnership (MIP), which seeks to provide additional support for children and young people living in and attending school with exceptional educational needs. To date the partnership has supported over 400 children and young people with interventions ranging from practical resources through to art therapy and mentoring.

Launched in April 2023, the MIP devolves the distribution of additional resources to schools, who work collaboratively in six geographical groups called 'clusters' - simply schools in the eastern, central, and western parts of the borough. Each cluster meets monthly to discuss specific cases for support and collectively agree the level of needs/funding.

Katy Luciani (pictured), Cluster Lead, explains further: "Not all children with exceptional needs will have a diagnosis or an Education, Health, and Care Plan (EHCP). The MIP process is proving a more agile way of funding, so interventions are put in place as soon as needs are identified

"It has also improved the understanding of SEND amongst mainstream teachers and pupils. We have seen a lot of good practice emerging and this will help schools continue improving their SEND practice. The MIP offers an opportunity to share ideas and network in a way that wasn't possible previously."

NEWS ROUND-UP

MAKING RECYCLING EVEN EASIER

A new piece of hi-tech help can now instantly remove the problem of finding the best and most environmentally friendly way to dispose of residents' unwanted items.

Waste Wizard, which is completely free and user-friendly, is available to residents. To access it they have to visit the Council's website to find the online tool, or go to the Apple or Google Play app stores to download the app - search for LB Hounslow Waste Wizard.

Using the Waste Wizard, simply specify what item you want to dispose of and the app will show you how.

The tool contains detailed information on hundreds of items with predictive search and synonym detection, which makes it faster and easier for residents to find the right information.

Resident satisfaction survey scores highly

Just over 82% of residents have stated that they are satisfied with Hounslow as a place to live, whilst 88% agreed that their local area is a place where people from different backgrounds get on well.

These are just some of the findings from a recent survey commissioned by the Council as it looks to better understand core priorities or areas of dissatisfaction.

It covered things like: satisfaction with the Council and local area, satisfaction with Council services, priorities, climate change and net zero, community cohesion, safety and involvement.

Furthermore, the way the Council runs things is rising in popularity. Almost three-quarters say Hounslow Council is doing a good job, an improvement of 11% since 2018. Residents' most highly rated services are: Hounslow Libraries (88% say they are excellent or good), Hounslow Parks, (82% rate them excellent or good), and Recycling and Waste, where over three-quarters of residents (78%) identify the service as excellent or good. Three-quarters of residents support ambitions to make Hounslow Net Zero, 82% say they would happily make lifestyle changes to lower their carbon emissions, and similar numbers support schemes to reduce traffic through residential streets, reduce accident risk and help people walk or cycle more easily.

Importantly, residents were asked what three things the Council should focus on next year.

By far, the biggest priorities were 'Making more affordable homes available', 'Education, activities and support for young people' and 'Community safety'.



FAMILY HUBS BUZZING IN FIRST 12 MONTHS



Earlier this year a network of three Family Hubs launched across the borough.

Located in Brentford, Feltham and Hounslow Central, the first month saw just under 800 parents, carers, babies, children and young people utilise the service. By July 2024, the hubs had received a total of 4,541 visitors, with an average of 837 visitors each month.

Formerly Children Centres, the hubs support families with children aged between zero to five. With the expansion of services to families and children aged 0-19, or up to 25 years old, if they have special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), the number of visitors increased by 45% year on year.

Claire, a regular visitor to the Alf King Family Hub in Feltham since she was 16-weeks pregnant, takes part in baby sessions like yoga, massage and Stay and Play. She said: "My son really loves going to the Family Hub every day. We've also made good friends there. The Family Hub staff are always supportive."

SUMMER OF CULTURE 2024

Showcasing the best of culture and creativity

Now in its third year, the Council's flagship programme celebrating arts, culture and community did not disappoint. Back in June, Hounslow High Street was set alight by a scintillating mix of fire, dance and circus by Firebirds Pyrodise at Bell Square, which formally opened the Council's Summer of Culture programme. Since then, an array of approximately 100 events celebrating the very best of culture and creativity attracted combined audiences of 100,000.



FESTIVAL OF STORYTELLING

Run in partnership with organisations and



communities across the borough including Chiswick Flower Market, Hounslow Action for Youth and Hounslow's libraries and

historic houses, the festival encompassed a diversity of storytelling from across the world including Japan, Ireland and Sierra Leone.

OPEN HOUSE FESTIVAL

In September, iconic venues across the borough opened their doors to the public for free as part of the Londonwide Open House festival. Visitors accessed historic venues such as Boston Manor House, Kempton Steam Museum, Chiswick House and Gardens and Hogarth House, and soaked up the venues' culture and history.



TOURS & TRAILS

Residents and visitors of all ages enjoyed self-guided tours of Hounslow, Brentford, Feltham and Chiswick that will be available all year round. Commissioned by the Council, five local creatives and artists were guided through the music scene in Hounslow, the history of cinema in Chiswick, the hidden past of Feltham, or the personal and historical changes in Brentford.

FILMS ON THE GREEN

The hugely popular 'Films on the Green', organised by the Council, returned to parks, the riverside and residential spaces. Residents could enjoy some sunshine and four different blockbusters.

BRENTFORD'S CREATIVE MILE

Brentford's free Creative Mile art trail, which included artists from across the borough over a weekend of open studios and exhibitions, returned at the end of August. The Creative Mile trail connected venues with artists and creatives, including painters, ceramicists, hat makers, mosaic artists, jewellery makers, poets, musicians and sculptors.



ANHAD the contemporary South Asian outdoor arts festival

To coincide with South Asian Heritage Month, the annual festival, ANHAD, returned to Hounslow High Street in July - filling the space with live music performances and DJs. The event also featured an installation of large-scale flags by Kinetika People, creating a vibrant festival atmosphere on Bell Square.

CABINET QUESTION TIME: CLOSING THE GAP

Enhancing transport links, tackling waste management and investing in mental health and community spaces, were just some of the questions put forward at the most recent Cabinet Question Time.

Held quarterly, and hosted by an independent Chair for complete impartiality, the event provides the ideal platform for residents to ask the Leader of Hounslow Council as well as Cabinet members any questions they have about local issues.

Residents are encouraged to attend, get involved and help the Council to shape solutions that improve everyday life across the borough.

Dr Talac Mahmud who chaired the event is an NHS GP and the Clinical Director





for Great West Road Primary Care Network, a group of eight practices in Hounslow. He has 25 years of expertise in primary care and the NHS, has served on boards at commissioner (Professional Executive Committee) and provider (GP Federation) level. Dr Mahmud has a detailed understanding of operational demands, prioritising patients and service delivery.

He commented: "Cabinet Question Time is an opportunity for members of the

public to put questions to Hounslow councillors.

"From the mental health crisis, right through to transport and waste disposal, members of the public thoroughly probed the councillors, and discussion was lively. It was emotional, people shared their personal stories and experiences, including the Cabinet members.

"One particular highlight of the evening for me was that it was clear from the start that residents and councillors had a very clear shared sense of purpose and community - as indeed there is with the local authority and healthcare.



"It became clear that the best way to achieve our shared purpose is to close the gaps between the local authority and different bodies such as TfL, private landlords and NHS services - a huge challenge. Quite rightly, residents just want services to be delivered efficiently, no matter who provides them.



"It was a fantastic experience and I thoroughly enjoyed meeting with residents and councillors alike."

Q: It feels like we are facing a mental health and well-being crisis. In the post-pandemic world, a lot of people are suffering silently and very little is done at the Council level to promote mental health and well-being. I am interested to know: what are the Council's plans to improve this situation?

In recognition of the growing importance of mental health, Hounslow Council is investing £5 million in parks and green spaces to create more allotments, community gardens, and orchards. These spaces serve as places for relaxation and wellbeing, as well as providing residents with easy access to nature.

The Council also supports mental health through various programmes, including suicide awareness campaigns, dementia and Veterans' Cafés, respite support for carers and mental health support teams.

A set of new community hubs have also been established to provide residents with spaces to discuss their concerns, including access to support for mental health and other related issues.

Sam, who lives in Heston West, went to her local Heston and Cranford Area Forum, where she enjoyed some free food, hot drinks and live music from local students. She said: "I was sitting at home alone feeling isolated. The weather was worsening and the evenings were getting darker. I was feeling really low and wanted to go out and meet people, make connections and improve my confidence.

"Attending this forum was one of the best things I've done in ages. The people and community groups have really uplifted me. I've been able to connect with people, get involved with local activities and join community groups. This is something hard to do from home, especially when I don't have access to the internet yet. I am so glad I did it, it's really lifted my spirits."

Since attending, Sam has offered to volunteer with the Council's friendly Community Development Team, who organises the event.

The next round of Area Forums take place at the end of November and start of December.



IMPROVING RESIDENT EXPERIENCE

Hounslow Council knows people want to get in touch and access services with the least fuss possible, in different ways that suit them.

It is working to make sure that its online services are as good as any that residents use, and that they receive an excellent experience, whether online, on the phone or in-person.

A refreshed, more user-friendly website is being built so residents can get information and services they need as easily as possible. Everything will be in one, convenient place, as straightforward as online shopping or banking, where residents can find information, report issues, or apply for services with just a few clicks.

New e-forms have been developed to report animal issues, contact housing officers and access household support funds, and more will follow over the coming months.

A new 'web chat' feature to help people who need support instantly is also being trialled. That means people will get help without having to wait for an email or a call back.

Overall, this lets residents get things done faster and without long phone calls or paperwork. Residents can find information and get things done whenever it suits them by visiting www.hounslow.gov.uk

Those residents that want to or need to

talk to a human being can contact the Resident Experience officers by telephone 020 8583 2000 who will give help and advice there and then, or make sure callers are connected to the right team.

To make sure services are fully accessible in communities, a range of Council and partners' services can be accessed inperson at one of the Community Hubs. Hubs will open at locations across the borough next year, alongside those already open in Feltham, Brentford and Hounslow Central.

Working to deliver for everyone is ongoing and residents are encouraged to watch out for updates, give new services a try, and let the Council know what they think.

SAFE AS HOUNSLOW

Hounslow Council's new approach to community safety was introduced earlier this year and now has a full complement of staff. Three new team members are now working across the borough.

Employed to help keep crime low in Hounslow, the officers are already talking to local people, families and business owners about concerns they have. They want to know how the Council can best support people to feel safe and address anti-social behaviour affecting Hounslow's high streets and parks.

The Council's Safer Communities team also has dedicated officers dealing with complex, high-risk cases. This multi-disciplinary team is working to prevent crime by working with local people, in their neighbourhoods. With good working relationships with the police and other partners, the team is committed to keeping Hounslow safe.

One of the new Safer Communities Officers said, "Having grown up

in Hounslow, I know the borough inside-out and I understand about the different backgrounds and cultures. I'm really looking forward to delivering in my new role and being part of this exciting team."



Since 2021, more than 25,000 trees and whips have been planted, surpassing the Council's target. This has included orchards in parks and countryside sites, and whip beds to create green hedging barriers around playgrounds on residential streets and housing estates.

The Free Trees for Hounslow initiative. which ran for three years, has been particularly successful in engaging the community and encouraging stewardship of green spaces.

The Council has also planted native fruit trees in orchards, including apple, pear, and plum varieties, alongside flowering and broadleaf species, enhancing biodiversity in Hounslow. Over the past year, a community-wide effort has seen local residents, school pupils, and volunteer groups help with planting and maintenance.

To ensure the health and longevity of these trees, Greenspace has implemented a comprehensive aftercare plan, which includes watering during hot months, re-staking, and mulching.

RIDING HIGH WITH THE LATEST INSTALMENT OF CYCLEWAY 9

The new route from Watermans Park to Alexandra Road is now open for people to enjoy. The project is a partnership between Hounslow Council, Transport for London (TfL) and Hounslow Highways.

Cycleway 9 has been created to encourage more people to get around under their own steam, whether on foot, through pedal power or other wheeled ways of travelling.

The key features of the new route include:

- → Protected cycle lanes on both sides of the high street.
- → Two new pedestrian crossings on the high street, near Alexandra Road and Pottery Road.
- → High-quality pavement surfaces for pedestrians.
- → Upgrades to four existing pedestrian crossings at Ferry Lane, Ealing Road, North Road and Holland Gardens.



→ Redesign of side roads and junctions to make them safer for people walking and cycling.

This section is the latest in a series of Cycleway 9 connections in Hounslow, which include Chiswick High Road between Chiswick Lane and Heathfield Terrace, and from Watermans Park to Kew Bridge.

The total investment in Cycleway 9 to date is £9.7m. Council monitoring of the previously constructed route through Chiswick shows a 47% increase in cycling

between 2021 and when this section was finished in 2023.



Cabinet Member for Climate, Environment and Transport, said: "We are delighted that Hounslow's

Cycleway 9 is continuing to grow.

"This latest section provides the same high-quality design as our previous projects and we hope it will be just as popular as the other sections of the route."

BUILD CONFIDENCE

Did you know that adults can get free cycle training in Hounslow?

The Council's Active Travel Teams offers those living, working or studying in the borough the chance to take part in group cycle training sessions aimed at improving their confidence and cycling skills.

The sessions, led by qualified instructors, take place in local parks and on the borough's guieter roads, if the learner feels comfortable. The training is suitable for both beginners and those who want to improve their skills, learn to cycle safely as a group, build their confidence, and meet likeminded people.

The sessions are open to all, with no need to book in advance. Participation is on a first-come, first-served basis, and registration will take place upon arrival. Spaces are limited, so early arrival is encouraged to avoid disappointment.

The sessions take place at five venues across the borough: Heston Park, Osterley Park, Feltham Park, Lampton Park and Hanworth Park. Sessions run on weekdays and Saturday morning.

FREE CHILDREN'S CYCLE TRAINING

Hounslow Council is offering free cycle training for Year 6 children, following the National Standard Bikeability Training (formerly Cycling Proficiency).

This training is usually booked through your child's primary school, and if they missed out, additional courses are available during school holidays.

There are different courses available depending on your child's age and ability:

→ Learn to Ride: Designed for children who cannot yet ride a bike. This course focuses on building balance, coordination, and confidence, with lessons taking place off-road.

- → Bikeability Level 1 & 2: For children aged 9 and above who can already cycle. These sessions improve bike handling, control, and confidence, and introduce riders to cycling on guiet roads and simple junctions.
- → Bikeability Level 3: For children aged 11 and above who are confident cyclists. This advanced course prepares riders for complex road conditions, including busier streets, roundabouts, and multilane traffic. It also teaches route planning for safe journeys.

LIFT OFF FOR ISLEWORTH STATION

Passengers can now benefit from step free access to both platforms at Isleworth station following the completion of a £3m upgrade of the station and the surrounding area, funded by Network Rail and the London Borough of Hounslow.

The station now boasts two new lifts either of the raised platforms, making use of the existing subway, thanks to a £1m investment from Hounslow Council and funding from the Department for Transport's (DfT) 'Access for All' scheme (via Network Rail), which is used to create an obstacle free, accessible route from the station entrance to the platforms.

JOIN HOUNSLOW'S BEST DEFENDERS

Free flu and Covid-19 vaccines are now available for all eligible people in Hounslow. Residents can get vaccines on the NHS national booking site, by dropping into participating local pharmacies, or via Hounslow's Health Outreach Team, who will be out in communities over the next few months.

As part of the programme, the Council has been talking to residents to find out why they're getting vaccinated. It's discovered that many people are doing so because they want to keep others safe, as well as themselves. When you take the vaccines, you can join these people as part of Hounslow's Best Defenders, keeping all of us safe from potentially fatal illnesses.

Eva King, who is 84 and has been married to Herbert for 52 years, said: "I take the Covid-19 and flu vaccines to protect others, not just myself. I think everybody should take the vaccines, it's for the protection of all of us, the whole community."

Herbert and his wife Eva have been protective of their health throughout their lives. He has taken the Covid-19 vaccine eight times, and the flu jab many more. Eva credits him being in good health past his hundredth birthday to taking regular vaccinations.

"We get vaccinated to protect each other and to keep him alive," she said. "We both had Covid-19 this summer, around the time of his hundredth birthday party. The fact that they were both relatively mild cases and we were able to celebrate his birthday is down to the fact we both had a Covid-19 booster just a month earlier."

LUNG CHECK COULD SAVE LIVES

Those aged between 55 and 74 and smoke or have previously smoked, may be eligible for a free NHS lung check. The checks are quick, simple, and may spot any potential lung issues early, even without experiencing any symptoms.

The initial checks are guick and noninvasive and there are two main stages. The first involves a simple and quick telephone assessment with a patient care advisor. They will ask a series of questions including smoking history, lifestyle and

current health and wellbeing specially designed to assess the risk of developing lung cancer, which should take around 15 minutes.

If the advisor decides they want to carry out more checks, patients may be offered an in-person appointment for a low dose CT scan, which produces a detailed image of the lungs.

STAYING ACTIVE **OVER 60**

Residents aged 60 plus can increase their activity levels, reduce the risks of falls, and help test their balance abilities with a new tailored activity programme designed specifically for this age group.

The new Hounslow Steady and Active website lists a range of falls prevention services and activity sessions provided by Hounslow Council, West London NHS Trust, Lampton Leisure and voluntary sector partners.

Increasing activity levels and getting involved in exercise improves strength and balance, which helps prevent falls. Regular physical activity also increases bone health, reducing the risk of injuries and fractures associated with falls.

Attendees commented: "I started with chair yoga to ease myself into exercise, I now attend weekly yoga and Tai Chi classes, which have benefited my wellbeing, flexibility and improved my mobility."

"My parents attend chair yoga at the Danehurst Centre, and occasionally go to Tai Chi classes. It has been fabulous for them and it is helping them to get more active, which is so important for their mobility. I have seen such a positive change in them."

COULD YOU BE THEIR ONE?

To help save people from suicide in Hounslow, the Council has launched its Be Their One campaign – a new joint suicide awareness campaign with Hillingdon Council.

Focusing on the fact it only takes one person to save a life, it aims to raise awareness of the resources people can use to learn how to speak to people who are in crisis.

The Zero Suicide Alliance training helps residents find out about local crisis mental health services, giving those that take the training the best chance of helping someone in need.

It only takes around half an hour to complete, is recommended for anyone 16 and above, and includes scenarios and advice on how anyone can have a life-saving conversation.



Cllr Lily Bath, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Health Integration, said: "It's great to be working

with our neighbours in Hillingdon to help people across both boroughs to feel supported.

"I'd encourage everyone to take a little time out of their day to take the Zero Suicide Alliance training and generally familiarise themselves with the crisis lines available, both locally and nationally."



"It's vital that people take training"

Catherine, who lost her brother to suicide recently, said: "We never suspected a thing and it came as a huge shock when we learnt that he'd lost his life through suicide.

"It's vital that people take training to understand how to talk to people who are suicidal. Just like we are trained in using defibrillators and how to save people's lives when they are having a heart attack, it is equally as important to be able to deal with suicidal ideation.

"The Zero Suicide Alliance training gives people the tools to know what to do if and when a situation arises."

"For me [volunteering] has been really fulfilling, I've really enjoyed getting to know Donald. If someone is considering becoming a volunteer, they absolutely should. It'll make you feel better and you'll be doing good for someone in your community who might be experiencing loneliness."

Donald says he's delighted with the service he's had from BEfriend, adding: "I think they're doing amazing work".



Helen Crafter spent over forty years with the NHS, working mainly as a midwife but also as a nurse.

Now retired, she specialises in looking after babies and young children as a foster carer through Hounslow Council.

Why did you choose to foster?

I'd been interested in fostering for a long time, but it wasn't practical until my children grew up, so I just decided to take the plunge by taking early retirement, contacted social services and I was away.

Why did you opt for fostering with **Hounslow Council?**

It seemed simpler than registering with another local authority or a private agency. I'm very aware that we all pay lots of council taxes and know that private agencies charge more so it was just a very practical decision.

How does your experience with the NHS help you with fostering young children? I don't think it was crucial or has changed things much. I think having my own children has been quite helpful in terms of confidence. I know that I've been

given children with slightly more medical problems sometimes and you possibly do have more confidence to deal with those.

I think a lot of people could foster, it's probably an advantage to have a bit of a background in the field of children, but I know it's not necessary.

What are the three most important character traits you'd associate with being an effective foster carer? Patience, definitely. I think you have to have time to spend with the child. Babies need a lot of attention, that's fairly obvious, but older children need to talk quite a lot and be part of family life.

I think you need to be a very kind person. You need to maintain that kindness however difficult things get.

What's the best thing about fostering? I think the sense of purpose is really wonderful. It's a lovely feeling to know that you're doing something that will really change that child's life, and hopefully for the better – well certainly not for the worse – as it's exactly what they need at the time; a stable family life full of love and kindness and security.
